

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

- • An intermediate quilter must have made several quilts in either pieced or appliqué styles.
- •••• An intermediate/advanced guilter has more than intermediate quilting skills and the beginning of advanced skills.
- An advanced quilter will have made many complex quilts.

OG: On Grain

OTB: On The Bias

PWF: PreWashed Fabric

**QST:** Quarter Square Triangle

**RST:** Right Sides Together

**SST:** Side Setting Triangle

**UFO:** UnFinished Object WIP: Works In Progress

WOF: Width Of Fabric (from selvage to selvage)

WOW: White On White
